Leadership Development for BAGNC Alumni

The Mary Starke Harper Distinguished Lectureship

The Mary Stark Harper Distinguished Lectureship

highlights the career of a nurse whose outstanding leadership qualities and achievements serve to inspire others. The person for whom it is named - Mary Starke Harper, PhD, RN, FAAN (1919-2006) - was an American Academy of Nursing Living Legend and one of the country's foremost authorities on mental health and aging. Harper advocated for an organized system of support for families who provided long-term care to their elderly adults.



Selected Highlights & Accomplishments of Mary Starke Harper's Career:

Education

- Majored in nursing at Tuskegee Institute in Alabama
- Bachelor's in nursing and Master's degree in psychiatric mental health nursing from the University of Minnesota
- Doctorate in clinical psychology and medical sociology from St. Louis University

Career

- Rose through the ranks of the Veteran's Administration to become Director of Nursing
- Worked for the US Department of Health and Human Services (DHHS)
- Carter White House Director of the Office of Policy Development and Research for the 1981 Conference on Aging
- Led the effort to improve public hospitals' mental health systems in the Clinton White House
- Member of the National Advisory Council for the National Institute of Health/National Institute of Aging and of the US Surgeon General's Task Force on Mental Health
- Authored five books and 186 scholarly articles

Mathy Mezey, EdD, RN, FAAN

Mathy Mezey is Professor Emerita, Senior Research Scientist and Associate Director, The Hartford Institute for Geriatric Nursing, New York University College of Nursing. She worked as a public health nurse in New York City and taught at Lehman College, City University of New York. For 10 years she was a professor at the University of Pennsylvania School of Nursing where she directed the GNP program and the Robert Wood Johnson Foundation Teaching Nursing Home Program. From 1991 to 2008 she was the Independence Foundation Professor of Nursing Education at NYU, and in 1996, became the founding Director of the Hartford Institute.

Dr. Mezey has authored 11 books and over 90 publications. Her research and writing focus on geriatric nursing education, the quality of care for older people in hospitals and long-term care, and bioethical issues that affect decisions at the end of life.

Dr. Mezey holds honorary doctorates from Case Western Reserve University and Fairfield University. She is a Fellow of the American Academy of Nursing and the Gerontological Society of America (GSA). Among her awards are the Doris Schwartz Gerontological Nursing Research Award; in 2010, the Donald Kent Award from the GSA, a Lifetime Achievement Award from the National Gerontological Nursing Association; and, the Nascher-Manning Award from the American Geriatrics Society. She sits on the Board and Chairs the Executive Committee of the Visiting Nurse Service of New York and is Trustee Emeritus, Columbia University.

Dr. Mezey received her undergraduate and graduate education at Columbia University.

Speakers



Ruth A. Anderson, PhD, RN, FAAN

Ruth A. Anderson is the Virginia Stone Professor Nursing in the School of Nursing and Senior Fellow in the Center for the Study of Aging and Human Development at Duke University. Her research is dedicated to improving management of nursing homes, an area of rapidly growing need. She combines nursing, management, and complexity science in research to advanced better patient care and staff retention through management practices. She has identified the management practices that clinical leaders and nursing staff can use to improve outcomes, suggesting new targets for education, practice and policy.

Dr. Anderson has been principal investigator on large, interdisciplinary research studies using both quantitative and qualitative methods. In her prior work, she and her team developed a new intervention, CONNECT, for improving staff interactions and information exchange in long term care settings and is currently funded by NIH-National Institute of Nursing Research to test the intervention for its impact on reducing resident falls in nursing homes. She teaches PhD courses in chronic illness and care systems and mixed-methods research.

Patricia G. Archbold, DNSc, RN, FAAN

Patricia G. Archbold is an expert consultant for the John A. Hartford Foundation's Building Academic Geriatric Nursing Capacity Scholars Program based at the American Academy of Nursing. Her academic career has focused on improving the health and health care for older persons and their families through research, teaching and community service. She directed the Hartford Center of Geriatric Nursing Excellence and the National Research Service Award in Gerontological Nursing at the Oregon Health & Sciences University School of Nursing prior to assuming her current position. Dr. Archbold's research focuses on understanding family care for frail elders in ways that are relevant for nursing practice, and on evaluating nursing interventions designed to strengthen family care.

Dr. Archbold is a fellow in the Gerontological Society of America and the American Academy of Nursing; she has served on numerous international and national advisory groups. Family care research by Archbold and her collaborators has been acknowledged with several research awards including the Doris Schwartz and Helen Nahm Awards.



John Beilenson, MA

John Beilenson is President of Strategic Communications and Planning (SCP), a socially responsible consulting firm in Wayne, Pennsylvania, that works primarily in the nonprofit and public sectors.

Since 1993, Beilenson and SCP have provided communications consulting, strategic planning, branding, training, media and social media outreach, and web- and print-based writing services to nonprofit organizations, foundations, and public agencies. Along with a long-standing commitment to organizations serving children and families, Beilenson has developed a specialty in aging issues. He works or has worked with the American Federation for Aging Research, the John A. Hartford Foundation, Grantmakers In Aging, the National Council on Aging, the Gerontological Society of America, American Geriatrics Society, *TimeSlips*, and Senior Services of Seattle/King County, among others.

Beilenson is the author of the guided journal, *The Future Me: Authoring the Second Half of Your Life*, published by Peter Pauper Press in 2003. In addition, Beilenson has written or edited 15 other books including *On the Wings of Faith* and *Season of Light*, and contributed to several national magazines and journals including *Social Policy* and *Sports Illustrated*.

Beilenson has an A.B. from Harvard University in History and Literature and an M.A. in Communications Studies from the University of North Carolina-Chapel Hill. He is currently a member of the board of City Year Greater Philadelphia, Surrey Services for Seniors in Berwyn, PA.

Claudia J. Beverly, PhD, RN, FAAN

Claudia J. Beverly serves at the University of Arkansas for Medical Science campus as the Inaugural recipient of the Murphy Chair for Rural Aging Leadership and Policy in the College of Medicine, Founding Director of the Arkansas Hartford Center of Geriatric Nursing Excellence, Founding Director of the Arkansas Aging Initiative, Donald W. Reynolds Institute on Aging and Professor, Colleges of Nursing, Medicine and Public Health.

Dr. Beverly's areas of specialty and research interests include geriatrics and integrated community-based systems. Selected awards include selected to the first cohort, Robert Wood Johnson Nurse Executive Fellowship, the UAMS Faculty Service Award, and the Mary Tolle Wright Foundation award for Leadership from Sigma Theta Tau International. She directs the Arkansas Aging Initiative and serves as faculty of the Sigma Theta Tau Geriatric Nurse Leadership Academy. Dr. Beverly's nursing home policy work includes being one of the founding members of the Arkansas Coalition for Nursing Home Excellence and served as a Steering Committee Member of the Advancing Excellence in America's Nursing Homes.

Dr. Beverly has a PhD in nursing from the University of Tennessee, Memphis, with a focus in Community Based Care for Older Adults.



Barbara Bowers, PhD, RN, FAAN

Barbara Bowers is the Associate Dean for Research and Helen Denne Schulte Professor at the University of Wisconsin-Madison. She earned her bachelors at the University of Michigan, Master's at Wayne State University and Doctorate from the University of California-San Francisco.

Dr. Bowers' research is with frail, older adults in both community and residential settings. She is interested in how public policies and organizational practices influence quality of care and quality of life. She is also interested in work life quality for workers in long term care systems.

Dr. Bowers' research has examined causes of staff turnover, the relationships among organizational structure, organizational culture and management practices, and care outcomes. Recent work explores teaching methods for staff development in long term care and organizational obstacles that interfere with using knowledge. Dr. Bowers has extensive experience in qualitative research methods, particularly Grounded Theory.

Pamela Z. Cacchione, PhD, APRN, GNP, BC

Pamela Z. Cacchione is the Associate Director of the Hartford Center of Geriatric Nursing Excellence at the University of Pennsylvania, School of Nursing. She is a Geriatric Nurse Practitioner, and maintains a practice at LIFE UPENN, focusing on Geropsychiatric concerns in the members of the LIFE program.

Dr. Cacchione joined the University of Pennsylvania, School of Nursing two years ago from Saint Louis University where she received her doctorate. She completed postdoctoral studies at the University of Iowa, College of Nursing.

Dr. Cacchione is the Editor of *Clinical Nursing Research*; An International Journal. She recently completed data collection on her NINR RO 1 that investigates the efficacy of a nursing intervention, Individualized-Sensory Enhancement of the Elderly, in improving vision and hearing in long-term care residents. She has multiple publications in the areas of sensory impairment and delirium in older adults.

Deborah D'Avolio, PhD, BC-ACNP, ANP

Deborah D'Avolio has focused her research on the needs of acutely ill older adults, geriatric syndromes, cognitive impairment, and translational research. Dr. D'Avolio has completed a geriatric research postdoctoral fellowship through the John A. Hartford/Atlantic Philanthropies Claire Fagin Fellowship at the University of Pennsylvania, Center for Geriatric Nursing Excellence.

Dr. D'Avolio holds an appointment as a Nurse Scientist at the Yvonne L. Munn Center for Nursing Research, Massachusetts General Hospital. In 2009, she served as a Leadership Mentor in the inaugural cohort of the Sigma Theta Tau International Geriatric Nursing Leadership Academy.

Deborah presently serves on the Evidence Based Practice Education Committee of the National Geriatric Nurses Association and is Co-Chair of Education Committee of the Greater Boston National Geriatric Nurses Association. She is Chair of the Sustainability and Finance Committee of the John A. Hartford Foundation BAGNC Alumni Association. Dr. D'Avolio has been selected as the recipient of the Sigma Theta Tau 2011 International Award for Geriatric Nursing Leadership.

Joanne Disch, PhD, RN, FAAN

Joanne Disch is Clinical Professor and Director of the Katharine J. Densford International Center for Nursing Leadership, and holds the Katherine R. and C. Walton Lillehei Chair in Nursing Leadership at the University of Minnesota School of Nursing. She has extensive experience as an educator, chief nurse executive, researcher, leader, policy maker and spokesperson. She received her BS in Nursing from the University of Wisconsin (Madison); her MSN from the University of Alabama in Birmingham; and her PhD from the University of Michigan.

Dr. Disch is the President of the American Academy of Nursing and has held numerous national leadership positions, including board member and chair of the board for AARP, formerly known as the American Association of Retired Persons; president of the American Association of Critical-Care Nurses; chair of the University Healthcare Consortium's Chief Nurse Executive Council; and chair of the American Nurses Association's Committee on Nursing Practice Standards and Guidelines.

Dr. Disch has received numerous awards including two Founders Awards from Sigma Theta Tau International for Excellence in Fostering Professional Standards and Excellence in Leadership. In 2008, she received the Distinguished Alumna Award from the University of Wisconsin.



Claire Fagin, PhD, RN, FAAN

Claire Fagin, BAGNC's first Program Director, has made noted contributions in both psychiatric nursing and geriatric nursing as well as to nursing education and administration and consumer organizations. Presently, she is Leadership Professor Emerita and Dean Emerita at the University of Pennsylvania and consultant to foundations, developing national programs, and educational institutions.

Dr. Fagin served as Dean of the School of Nursing at the University of Pennsylvania from 1977 to 1992. During her tenure, the School developed landmark education and research programs, a privately funded research center, a PhD program, had the most faculty members of any nursing school in the American Academy of Nursing and the Institute of Medicine, and was ranked #1 by US News and World Report. Dr. Fagin served as the Interim President of the University from July 1, 1993 to June 30, 1994. At the conclusion of her term the University was at a higher rank than at any time in its history and had its best ever results in fund raising. Dr. Fagin was the first woman to serve as Chief Executive Officer of the University and the first woman to serve a term as Interim President of any Ivy League University. Dr. Fagin has received 14 honorary doctoral degrees and numerous awards, including the Honorary Recognition Award of the American Nurses Association.

Terry Fulmer, PhD, RN, FAAN

Terry Fulmer is the Dean of the Bouvé College of Health Science at Northeastern University. Previously, she was an Erline Perkins McGriff Professor and Dean of the College of Nursing at the College of Dentistry at New York University. She received her bachelor's degree from Skidmore College, her master's and doctoral degrees from Boston College, and her Geriatric Nurse Practitioner Post-Master's Certificate from New York University.

Dr. Fulmer's program of research focuses on acute care of the elderly and specifically, elder abuse and neglect. She has received the status of Fellow in the American Academy of Nursing, the Gerontological Society of America, and the New York Academy of Medicine.

Dr. Fulmer completed a Brookdale National Fellowship and is a Distinguished Practitioner of the National Academies of Practice. Dr. Fulmer was the first nurse to be elected to the board of the American Geriatrics Society and the first nurse to serve as the President of the Gerontological Society of America. Her field of research is in acute care of the elderly and elder abuse.



Jennie Chin Hansen, RN, MS, FAAN

Jennie Chin Hansen is CEO of the American Geriatrics Society (AGS) and immediate past President of AARP. She has served on numerous boards and commissions including serving as an IOM member on the RWJ Initiative on the Future of Nursing. In 2005, she transitioned after nearly 25 years with On Lok, Inc., a nonprofit family of organizations providing integrated, globally financed and comprehensive primary, acute and long-term care community based services in San Francisco. The On Lok prototype became the 1997 federal Program of All Inclusive Care to the Elderly (PACE) Program into law for Medicare and Medicaid. PACE now has urban and rural programs in 30 states.

Jennie has received multiple awards over the years including the 2003 Gerontological Society of America Maxwell Pollack Award for Productive Living, a 2005 Administrator's Achievement Award from the Centers for Medicare and Medicaid Services, and the 2011 Picker Award for Excellence in the Advancement of Patient Centered Care in Long Term Care.



Colleen Keller, PhD, RN, FAHA

Colleen Keller is a Foundation Professor in Women's Health and Director of the Hartford Center of Geriatric Nursing Excellence and the Center on Healthy Outcomes in Aging at Arizona State University, College of Nursing & Healthcare Innovation, Phoenix, AZ. She is also Associate Investigator, Cancer Prevention and Control Program and Core Faculty Arizona Center on Aging, at the University of Arizona, Tucson, AZ.

She has received the Regional Geriatric Research Award, Western Institute of Nursing, Forces of Change Mentorship Award from the Global Caring Nurses Foundation, and the Distinguished Researcher, March of Dimes, Phoenix, AZ. Colleen is a Distinguished Practitioner, National Academies of Practice, and a Fellow, American Heart Association.

Her research concerning weight management and cardiovascular risk reduction in women spans 20 years. She has received NIH funding, foundation funding, and national competitive grants to sustain both her research, teaching, and program development efforts. She maintains a clinical practice at Planned Parenthood and Maricopa Integrated Health System.

Ashley Leak PhD, RN-BC, OCN

Ashley Leak is a Cancer Care Quality Post Doctoral Fellow through the Gillings School of Global Public Health Department of Health Policy and Management at the University of North Carolina at Chapel Hill. She is also an Adjunct Assistant Professor at the School of Nursing at UNC Chapel Hill. Dr. Leak was a 2009-2011 predoctoral John A. Hartford Foundation Building Academic Geriatric Nursing Capacity Scholar.

She earned a Bachelor of Science and Master of Science (Nursing Administration) from The University of North Carolina at Greensboro and a PhD from UNC Chapel Hill. She also completed an interdisciplinary Certificate in Aging through the Institute of Aging at UNC Chapel Hill. She is dually certified as an oncology and gerontological nurse. Dr. Leak has a clinical and research interest in assisting cancer patients with their unmanaged symptoms to reduce ED visits and hospitalizations. Her dissertation focused on factors associated with non Hodgkin lymphoma (NHL) survivors' quality of life. She was just elected North Carolina Nurses Association (NCNA) Gerontology Council Chair. Currently, she is serving as a content expert panel member for the Gerontology Certification Exam through the American Nurses Credentialing Center (ANCC). She is also actively involved in the BAGNC Alumni Association Peer Mentoring Committee.

Angela Barron McBride, PhD, RN, FAAN

Angela Barron McBride received her BSN from Georgetown University, her MSN from Yale University, and her PhD in developmental psychology from Purdue University. She is Distinguished Professor-University Dean Emerita at Indiana University School of Nursing. During her tenure as Dean, she served as Senior Vice President for Academic Affairs-Nursing within Clarian Health, the largest hospital network in Indiana and one of the largest in the United States. Currently, she is a member of the Indiana University Health Board, and Committee on Quality and Patient Safety.

Dr. McBride is known for her contributions to women's health, particularly the psychology of parenthood, and to psychiatric nursing. She also designs the annual leadership conference of the John A. Hartford Foundation's Building Academic Geriatric Nursing Capacity Program and chairs the national advisory committee for the Robert Wood Johnson Foundation's Nurse Faculty Scholar Program.

For her contributions, she has been honored with various professional awards and honorary doctorates, elected to the IOM, and designated in 2006 as a Living Legend by the American Academy of Nursing.



Margaret P. Moss, PhD, JD, RN, FAAN

Margaret P. Moss is an enrolled member of the Three Affiliated Tribes of North Dakota- the Mandan, Hidatsa, and Arikara Nation. She is an Associate Professor and Director of the Nursing Management, Policy, and Leadership Specialty at the Yale School of Nursing. She will direct Yale's new DNP program in 2012.

Dr. Moss received her PhD in Nursing from the University of Texas at Houston, Health Sciences Center in 2000; her dissertation was an ethnography on aging in the Zuni tribe of New Mexico. She subsequently received a distinguished alumni award. Dr. Moss then entered and completed Law School focusing on Federal Indian law, elder law and health law. She is one of only 20 doctorally-prepared American Indian nurses in the country and is the first and only American Indian to hold both Nursing and Juris Doctorates.

Dr. Moss was a 2008-2009 Robert Wood Johnson Health Policy Fellow, and staffed the Senate Special Committee on Aging under Senators Martinez and Corker. She has a focus in American Indian Aging specifically and completed a 2 year Postdoctorate Fellowship at the Native Elder Research Center, an NIH funded Resource Center for Minority Aging Research based at the University of Colorado. Dr. Moss was appointed by Governor Pawlenty to the Minnesota Board on Aging and was a delegate for the National Congress of American Indians to the 2005 White House Conference on Aging.

Ginette A. Pepper, PhD, RN, FAAN

Ginny A. Pepper is the Helen Lowe Bamberger Colby Presidential Endowed Chair in Gerontological Nursing and Associate Dean for Research and PhD Program at the University of Utah College of Nursing. Her research relates to adverse drug effects on the functional status of older adults. A nurse pharmacologist who received her PhD in nursing and pharmacology from the University of Colorado, she currently is co-investigator on studies using eccentric exercise in fall prevention in frail elders, a meta-analysis of psychotropic drugs and falls, and of the role of interprofessional communication in preventing adverse drug events in hospitalized older adults. Previously federally funded projects relate to medication safety, medication-related imbalance and falling in older adults, and a translational research study on improving pain management in nursing homes. In addition, Dr. Pepper directs the University of Utah Hartford Center of Geriatric Nursing Excellence.

Dr. Pepper was the nation's first geriatric nurse practitioner on a demonstration project in nursing homes. She has held membership on national interdisciplinary panels including NIH Study Sections, the Nomenclature, Safety and Labeling Expert Committee of the United States Pharmacopeia, editorial boards, and the National Health Information Infrastructure Project of the Department of Health and Human Services.



Lori L. Popejoy, PhD, APRN, GCNS-BC

Lori L. Popejoy is an Assistant Professor of Nursing at the University of Missouri. She has over 30 years of nursing experience and is a graduate from the University of Missouri with her PhD in 2007. Dr. Popejoy teaches theory and quality and safety graduate nursing courses. She is a fellow in the Interdisciplinary Center on Aging at the University of Missouri.

Dr. Popejoy was a member of the 2002 cohort of John A. Hartford Foundation Pre-Doctoral Scholars and was Claire M. Fagin Fellow from 2009-2011. She is a board certified gerontological clinical nurse specialist. Both her research and practice interests center on issues surrounding discharge planning and nurse care coordination of frail older adults. She has held leadership positions in acute care, and home healthcare—Aging in Place, and has worked extensively on long term care research projects.

Dr. Popejoy currently leads two multidisciplinary research teams focused on understanding problems related to admissions to nursing homes and home healthcare agencies from hospitals, and a NINR funded study entitled, Care Coordination for Older Adults: Process, Outcomes, and Cost.

Marilyn Rantz, PhD, RN, FAAN

A leader in the area of long-term care research, Marilyn Rantz served as the Principal Investigator (PI) for a \$2.7 million 2005 National Institutes of Health (NIH); the largest ever award given to a researcher at the Sinclair School of Nursing. In 1993, she formed the Missouri University MDS and Quality Research Team: an interdisciplinary research team comprised of faculty from the Schools of Nursing, Medicine, Health Professions, and Biostatistics that's devoted to improving the quality of care for elderly in LTC nursing facilities. The team has become a nationally and internationally known group of experts in the field. Other programs of research funded through NSF, AOA, AHRQ, and NIH, have focused on the use of different types of technology, such as motion and fall sensors, to provide assistance to elders who wish to remain in their own homes. Much of this research is conducted at TigerPlace, an assisted living facility that is a joint venture between the School of Nursing and the Americare Corporation. Dr. Rantz was part of the School of Nursing team who worked on the original design for TigerPlace, and today is the School's Director for the facility. TigerPlace provides both an independent living environment for the area's seniors and an opportunity for students from a variety of professional areas to interact with older adults. As Associate Director for MU's Interdisciplinary Center on Aging, she also served as the PI for "Building Interdisciplinary Geriatric Health Care Research Centers," funded in 2007 through Hartford.

Susan Reinhard, PhD, RN

Susan Reinhard is a Senior Vice President at AARP, directing its Public Policy Institute, the focal point for public policy research and analysis at the state, federal and international levels. She also serves as the Chief Strategist for the Center to Champion Nursing in America at AARP, a national resource and technical assistance center created to ensure that America has the nurses it needs to provide care both now and in the future.

Dr. Reinhard is a nationally recognized expert in health and long-term care policy, with extensive experience in conducting, directing and translating research to promote policy change. Prior to AARP, Dr. Reinhard served as a Professor and Co-Director of Rutgers Center for State Health Policy where she directed several national initiatives to work with states to help people with disabilities of all ages live in their homes and communities. Previously, she served three governors as Deputy Commissioner of the New Jersey Department of Health and Senior Services, where she led the development of health policies and nationally recognized programs for family caregiving, consumer choice and control in health and supportive care, assisted living and other community-based care options, quality improvement, state pharmacy assistance, and medication safety. She also co-founded the Institute for the Future of Aging Services in Washington, DC and served as its Executive Director of the Center for Medicare Education.

Jimmy A. Reyes, DNP, AGNP

Jimmy A. Reyes is a 2008-2010 BAGNC Predoctoral Scholar and PhD student at the University of Iowa College of Nursing. He received his BSN, MSN, and Adult/Geriatric Nurse Practitioner degrees from the University of Iowa, and most recently, graduated with a DNP from the same institution.

Dr. Reyes' research focuses on developing and piloting a culturally anchored, family-focused, educational partnership program to enhance diabetes self-management with an emphasis on nutrition for Latinos with diabetes in Federally Qualified Health Centers. This groundwork will provide the means to develop and implement culturally anchored protocols and guidelines in the care of Latinos with diabetes.

Dr. Reyes holds a leadership position at Sigma Theta Tau, Gamma Chapter, and is the Chair of the non-profit organization, MyHealthIowa (MiSaludIowa).



Elena O. Siegel, PhD, RN

Elena O. Siegel is an Assistant Professor at the Betty Irene Moore School of Nursing at UC Davis and a 2011 Robert Wood Johnson Foundation Nurse Faculty Scholar.

Dr. Siegel earned a bachelor's degree in business administration from California State University, Northridge, in 1980 and worked for several years as a certified public accountant and controller before transitioning to a career in nursing. She earned a Bachelor of Science in Nursing in 2002, a Master of Nursing in 2003, and Doctor of Philosophy in 2006, all from the University of Washington School of Nursing.

Dr. Siegel's teaching support students' development of the systems and business acumen necessary for nursing leadership and research in complex health-care environments. Her research focuses on organizational and workforce capacity to improve the quality and value of long-term care. Dr. Siegel's current study examines the ways in which nursing home leaders make decisions about which quality improvement initiatives their organizations will adopt and the organizational and leadership factors that contribute to successful implementation and sustainability of those initiatives. Dr. Siegel was the recipient of both a predoctoral scholarship and Claire M. Fagin postdoctoral fellowship from the John A. Hartford Foundation Building Academic Geriatric Nursing Capacity program. She also received research funding from the American Nurses Foundation.

Janet K. Specht, PhD, RN, FAAN

Janet K. Specht's research interests include practice models to promote professional nursing; diagnosis, interventions and outcomes for older persons with urinary incontinence; and care of persons with dementia and their families. Dr. Specht had a grant through the Administration on Aging and the Iowa Department of Elder Affairs for a demonstration project to increase access to, and use of community based dementia-specific services in rural Iowa. The proposed model included the use of Nurse Care Managers to deliver direct services to persons with dementia and their caregivers and a community development program.

Dr. Specht currently has a grant from NINR to implement Evidence Based Practice for Pain Management and Continence Promotion in 50 nursing homes in Iowa. She and her partner Dr. Meridean Maas developed and operated an alternative living facility for persons' with dementia for 5 years and currently own and operate HomeSafe, a care management business to help maintain older persons in their preferred living arrangements.

Prior to joining the faculty at the college of nursing in 1999, Dr. Specht was Director of Nursing at an 800 bed long term care facility for 29 years, an investigator on a Family Involvement in Care Alzheimer's Grant and a research scientist on a VA grant to use telemedicine to improve care for chronically ill veterans.



Neville E. Strumpf, PhD, RN, FAAN

Neville E. Strumpf is widely recognized for her outstanding contributions to the field of gerontology. Although Dr. Strumpf is probably best known for her work with her colleague, Dr. Lois Evans, on the elimination of physical restraints in nursing homes and hospitals, her remarkable career as a ground-breaking researcher, innovative teacher, caring mentor, as well as top administrator, is unmatched. While Dr. Strumpf officially retired from the University of Pennsylvania in 2008, she continues to work part-time as a Co-Director of the Resource Center for Minority Aging Research in the School of Medicine and Coordinator of the School of Nursing's Faculty Mentoring Program, and continues to collaborate with colleagues on research related to older adults.

Dr. Strumpf continues to work closely with doctoral students and post-doctoral fellows, to partner with colleagues on grants and papers, and to consult on numerous educational and research projects.

Cheryl G. Sullivan, MSES

Cheryl G. Sullivan is the Chief Executive Officer of the American Academy of Nursing and the former Deputy Chief of Policy to U.S. Senator Evan Bayh. She began her role as CEO on September 13, 2010.

Throughout her career, Sullivan has been instrumental in the development of significant health care-related legislation and has provided leadership in government and university administration, and fundraising. From 1997-2005, she served as the Vice Chancellor for External Affairs at Indiana University-Purdue University Indianapolis, one of the nation's largest urban universities. Sullivan formerly served as the principal advisor on social service policy to two Governors as chief executive of Indiana's largest agency, the Family and Social Services Administration.

Sullivan is pursuing a PhD at Indiana University; she received her Bachelor's of Science in Biological Sciences from the University of Maryland, and earned a Master's of Science in Environmental Science from Indiana University, School of Public and Environmental Affairs.

Eileen M. Sullivan-Marx, PhD, RN, FAAN

Eileen M. Sullivan-Marx is a Professor of Scholarly Practice and Associate Dean for Practice & Community Affairs at the University of Pennsylvania School of Nursing, holding the Shearer Endowed Term Chair in Healthy Community Practice. Dr. Sullivan-Marx chaired Pennsylvania's Senior Care and Services Study Commission and is a 2010-12 Health and Aging Policy Fellow & Senior Advisor to the Center for Medicare and Medicaid Services, Medicare/Medicaid Coordinating Office.

Dr. Sullivan-Marx is an active consultant on geriatric practice issues and oversees the School's practice and community mission that includes the award winning Living Independently For Elders (LIFE), a program of comprehensive integrated health and social services for older adults in West Philadelphia. She is a leading researcher on improving functional outcomes of older adults in community and institutional settings.

Among her many awards are the 2008 Eastern Nursing Society Hartford Geriatric Nurse Research Award, the 2010 Pennsylvania State Nurses Associate Advocacy-Legislative Award, and the 2011 Sigma Theta Tau International Founders Award for Excellence in Nursing Practice.

Hilaire Thompson, PhD, RN, CNRN, FAAN

Hilaire Thompson, a former Claire M. Fagin Fellow, is an Assistant Professor at the University of Washington School of Nursing and Harborview Injury Prevention and Research Center. Dr. Thompson received her PhD from the University of Pennsylvania and has received additional training as an clinical epidemiologist (MS Epi '08 University of Washington).

Dr. Thompson's program of research is dedicated to ameliorating the effects of traumatic brain injury (TBI) on the older adult by using translational approaches to inform and deliver evidenced-based care. In addition, collaborating with colleagues in informatics and engineering, she has been pursuing the integration of innovative technologies in provision of healthcare to older adults with the goal of preventing adverse events such as falls and reducing the risk of TBI in order to maximize independence and promote wellness. Her work is currently supported by NIH.

At the University of Washington, Dr. Thompson teaches the undergraduate gerontological nursing course and mentors graduate students interested in geriatrics and gerontology. Her current national leadership activities include serving as the Editor of the American Association of Neuroscience Nursing's Clinical Practice Guideline Series, member of the Institute of Medicine's Committee on Cognitive Rehabilitation Therapy for Traumatic Brain Injury, and the incoming Chair of the GSA Health Sciences Section Education Committee.



Mark Toles, PhD, RN

Mark Toles is a postdoctoral scholar in the Duke University School of Nursing. He is an advanced practice nurse with clinical experience in transitional care, behavioral health and nursing management. In his current research, he seeks to expand understanding of transitional care for skilled nursing facility patients by describing transitional care in multiple nursing homes and the variation between skilled nursing facilities that explains quality of care. In this research, he also studies how interactions among patients, family members and professional staff influence the effectiveness of transitional care processes and how these interactions might be cultivated to improve health outcomes.

Dr. Toles is a member of the Measurement Workgroup in the Long Term Quality Alliance and is the principal investigator on an epidemiological study of transitional care outcomes for older adults after discharge from short stays in skilled nursing facilities. Dr. Toles's research is supported by a John A. Hartford/Atlantic Philanthropies Claire M. Fagin Postdoctoral Fellowship and a National Institute for Nursing Research T-32 postdoctoral fellowship through the NewCourtland Center for Transitions and Health at the University of Pennsylvania.

Janet Van Cleave, PhD, RN

Janet Van Cleave is a Clinical Assistant Professor at the New York University College of Nursing and is a member of the Hartford Institute for Geriatric Nursing. Her program of research focuses on developing effective interventions to improve the transitional care of older adults with cancer across health care settings. She received her PhD from Yale University in 2008 where she was a John A. Hartford Foundation 2006 - 2008 Building Academic geriatric Nursing Capacity Pre-Doctoral Scholar.

Dr. Van Cleave completed a post-doctoral fellowship at University of Pennsylvania School of Nursing, NewCourtland Center for Transitions and Health. Her post-doctoral training focused on the quality and cost of health care services delivered to older adults with multiple chronic conditions. Dr. Van Cleave also received her BSN/MSN from University of Pennsylvania School of Nursing, MBA from University of Kansas, and BA from Kansas State University.



Margaret I. Wallhagen, PhD, GNP-BC, AGSF, FAAN

Meg I. Wallhagen is a Professor of Gerontological Nursing and a Geriatric Nurse Practitioner in the School of Nursing, University of California San Francisco (UCSF). Since joining the faculty at UCSF in 1988, she has taught gerontological nursing at both the masters and doctoral level, and works as a Geriatric Nurse Practitioner.

Dr. Wallhagen's research and publications focus on studies of: the experience of control in caregivers and in persons with diabetes; education and self management in diabetes; successful aging for persons with chronic conditions; self care and symptom management; cross cultural interventions to support family caregivers with dementia; family conflict and coping; and the impact of hearing impairment on older adults. She recently completed a four year longitudinal study of the experience of hearing impairment in older adults and their partners.

In January 2006, Dr. Wallhagen became the Director of the UCSF/John A. Hartford Center of Geriatric Nursing Excellence. Most recently, Dr. Wallhagen became the Senior Nurse Faculty Mentor for the Veterans Affairs National Quality Scholars Fellowship Program. Dr. Wallhagen is involved with and has served on the Board of Family Caregiver Alliance, Bread for the World, and the Hearing Loss Association of America.

Rachael Watman, MSW

Rachael Watman is a senior program officer at the John A. Hartford Foundation. She is responsible for managing \$50 million in grants, with primary oversight of the nursing portfolio, including nine Centers of Geriatric Nursing Excellence and their coordinating center at the American Academy of Nursing.

Ms. Watman has worked in the field of aging for 15 years. Before coming to the Hartford Foundation, she served as director of an adult day program in New York City for older adults with dementia and helped manage a Continuing Day Treatment Center for older adults with chronic mental illness. There, she was responsible for programmatic, regulatory compliance, staff supervision, and budgetary issues. In addition, Ms. Watman has served as director of a case management program for over 500 seniors in Queens, New York, providing individualized support to maximize their independence so they could remain safely at home. She also worked as a member of a geriatric treatment team for an inpatient psychiatric clinic at a large New York hospital and in a residential home in Virginia for adults with autism.

Ms. Watman earned her undergraduate degrees in American Studies and Psychology at Mary Washington College in Virginia and her master's in social work with a specialization in aging from Columbia University.

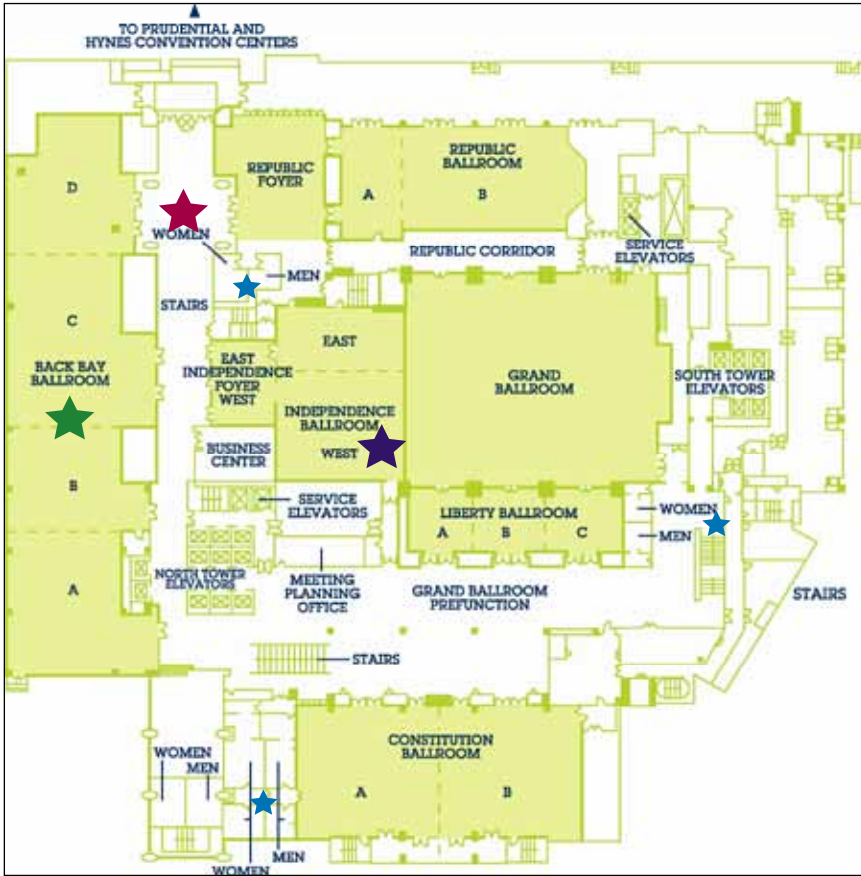

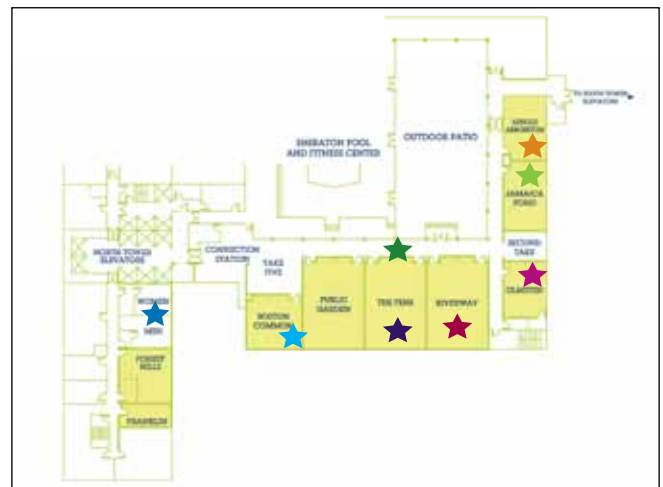
